What is Broadband and Why is it Important?

Today, broadband is essential to participate in society. Disconnected consumers, which are disproportionately low-income consumers, are at an increasing disadvantage as institutions and schools, and even government agencies, require Internet access for full participation in key facets of society.

. . .

[S]tudent access to the internet has become a necessity, not a luxury."

Measuring the Digital Divide

2020 FCC Study: Fixed Broadband



Nationwide Access: 94.4%

• Urban: 98.5%

• Rural: 77.7%

• Tribal Lands: 72.3%

• Rural Tribal Lands: 52.9%



Nationwide Adoption: 65.1%

• Urban: 69.2%

• Non-Urban: 59.9%

• Tribal Lands: 44.0%

• Non-urban Tribal Lands:38.7%



Disparities in Broadband Access

Neighborhood Adoption Rates:

- Black neighborhoods: 67%
- white neighborhoods: 84%


Tribal lands:

- No access to any fixed broadband: 32%
- Access to only one provider: 36%

Education:

16.9 million children lack home broadband:


- > 30% of Black, Latino & Native American households with school-aged kids
- Pre-pandemic 21% of Black students used public Wi-Fi to complete homework





» COVID-19 Pandemic:

- Increased need for telehealth and educational access
- Fewer opportunities to utilize broadband at libraries and school buildings
- Economic consequences threaten household ability to continue to pay for service.





Coronavirus Aid Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act

\$13 billion

• Education agencies to purchase technology, including connectivity to support remote learning

\$3 billion

• Emergency education relief for states to improve remote learning

\$200 million

• Expand telehealth access

\$50 million

• Institute for Museum and Library Service to expand digital network access




FCC COVID-19 Relief: Voluntary Commitments

» Keep America Connected Pledge

- Voluntary commitments from broadband providers to waive late fees, not terminate service, open Wi-Fi hotspots
- Expired on June 30, 2020
- Chairman Pai has urged Congressional action to ensure

"doctors and patients, students and teachers, low-income families and veterans, those who have lost their jobs and livelihoods due to the pandemic and the accompanying lockdowns"

remain connected throughout the pandemic response.





FCC COVID-19 Relief: USF Programs

E-rate

- Waived gift rules
- Urged providers to provide mobile hotspots and broadband enabled devices
- FCC has not authorized the use of E-rate funds to provide broadband service directly to students that lack broadband at home

Lifeline

- Eased application requirements for newly eligible households
- Participants cannot be unwittingly unenrolled in the program

Healthcare Connect Fund


• Waived gift rules

Connected Care Pilot Program

- Support telehealth efforts
- Off-site broadband services for patients without home access



Local Solutions





Actions for Change

Federal

- Bar state preemption of local broadband
- Allow E-rate funds to support offsite broadband
- Increase Lifeline discount
- Bundle Lifeline enrollment
- Collect data on affordability and availability, demographics,
- Increase funding to schools and community centers

State

- Eliminate preemption laws
- Enact dig once laws
- Set statewide connectivity goals and deadlines

Local

- Increase mobile hotspots provided by cities, counties, schools
- Free city wide wireless
- Broadband service through community anchor institutions
- Support broadband provided by local public utilities and cooperatives
- Public private partnerships to support broadband connectivity
- Community wide connectivity goals


