
Population (vs individual)

Gun violence has increased in the US and Philadelphia


Firearm crude death rate per 100K population, U.S. and Philadelphia County, 1990-2021

Fatal shooting crude rate per 100K population by race, ethnicity, and sex, Philadelphia County, 2021





Create hypothetical, un-preempted Philadelphia

- Identified 26 Philadelphia ordinances (2000-2021) that could not be enforced due to preemption
- Hypothetical Philadelphia = Pennsylvania + these
 26 ordinances



Compare mortality in Philadelphia to hypothetical, un-preempted Philadelphia

- 541 excess firearm deaths between 2001 and 2020
- Average increase of 1.8 deaths per 100,000 residents per year

After the South Street shooting, frustration mounts over the Pennsylvania law that keeps Philly from passing its own gun control



PHILADELPHIA (CBS/AP) -- As gun violence surges in the city, Philadelphia officials are joining families of gun violence victims in Philly and Pittsburgh, and are again filing a court challenge to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's prohibition on municipal gun regulations. The city, along with the Ceasefire Pennsylvania Education Fund and 10 family members, filed the lawsuit in Commonwealth Court on Wednesday, asking a judge to find that the state's Firearms Preemption laws violate Pennsylvanians' right to life under the state Constitution.






















Preemption and lawsuit



PA's Firearm Preemption Statutes

No county, municipality or township may in any manner regulate the lawful ownership, possession, transfer or transportation of firearms, ammunition or ammunition components when carried or transported for purposes not prohibited by the laws of this Commonwealth.

- 18 Pa. Cons. Stat. § 6120(a)
- Applicable everywhere in PA

A municipality shall not enact any ordinance or take any other action dealing with the regulation of the transfer, ownership, transportation or possession of firearms.

- 53 Pa. Cons. Stat. § 2962(g)
- Applicable everywhere except Philadelphia

Shocks the conscience

Foreseeable victim or member of discrete class

State acted affirmatively
