








Health is always on the ballot









Health is a Political Choice

Politics - a set of activities associated with making decisions in groups, or other forms of power relations between individuals such as the distribution of resources or status.



History: Electoral Expansion Improves Health

Expansion of Voting Access	Health Improvement
Women's Suffrage	Child mortality rates declined
Civil Rights Movement	More inclusive policies in education, housing, economic opportunity, and health care including Medicare and Medicaid
Voting Rights Act of 1965	Reductions in Black infant deaths in Southern counties subject to preclearance

All steps forward were contested "continuous struggle for power..."






Health & Democracy Index

- Compares 12 public health indicators and voter turnout to the restrictiveness of voting policies in each state.
- States with more voting access and greater civic participation have better health outcomes









OVERALL FINDINGS:


More Voting Access, Better Health Outcomes

States with more inclusive voting policies and greater levels of civic participation are healthier.





New Research: Restrictive Electoral Environments and the Health of Black Americans








Strong Democracies Support Key Health Reforms

States with stronger democracies were **3.72 times** more likely to have **expanded Medicaid eligibility by 2020**, regardless of state political environments, median household income, and educational attainment.



Civic participation in Wisconsin SHA/SHIP process, products, and funding

- Center the contribution of the community, people's voices in everything we do.
- Engage deeply with partners, invest in building trust and alliances, and focus on structural causes.
- Understand and account for power dynamics.





One Example

Statewide Health Assessment (SHA)

- Baseline, snapshot of data
- Overview of community conditions and the health of the people in the state
- Data that guides the selection of the priorities for the SHIP

Statewide Health Improvement Plan (SHIP)

- Sets priorities and creates a plan for strategic activities
- Approach to advancing health equity that focuses on improving the conditions that create better health for all.





Civic participation in Wisconsin SHA/SHIP development process

- 2020 SHA 74 community conversations facilitated by local partners.
- 2022 SHIP development series of listening sessions, conversations with community based partners.
- 2023 final process wrapped up with an "accountability stage," validating priorities with community and institutional partners.




Civic participation in Wisconsin SHA/SHIP funding

- Mobilizing Communities for a Just Response Grant
 - Supports local priority action
 - Focuses on partner and community mobilization for policy change
- QualData Grant
 - Increases public health's capacity for qualitative data, community conversations and engagement locally
 - Builds trust and connections with underrepresented communities
















Figure 8: Safe and sick time effective dates, 2016-2023
