- 90+ subject matter experts across the department



Why work with Community Navigators

 Changed landscape after Covid-19

 Wanted to hear from folks deeply embedded in community on what we should focus on post-covid

Community Navigators

- Program was formed and driven by trusted community leaders most impacted by Covid-19 and racial inequities
- Navigators are trusted messengers and community leaders serving over 45 different communities
- They provide guidance to Public Health and focus on the social determinants of health
- Existing long-term relationship with Policy team and Navigator program

Policy Area: Racism Impact on Health



- Better access to high quality, affordable, and culturallyappropriate food
- Ensure health care coverage is accessible and affordable to all residents
- Improve demographic data
- Improve access to high quality, affordable, and culturally-appropriate mental health services
- King County youth live in healthy and vibrant communities with access to housing, whole foods, health care, and quality education





Policy Area: Housing, Homelessness & Health



 Make the public health case for increasing the supply of affordable housing in King County

 Ensure long-term, dedicated **funding** to meet health needs of people living homeless and unstably housed





Policy Area: Climate Change & Health



- Pursue opportunities for community-based and public health practitioners to participate in policymaking and advisory groups
- Secure sustainable funding for public health technical support and community collaboration
- Reduce existing and new environmental hazards impactin g health in communities of color
- Promote direct investment in frontline communities.



2024-2029 Strategic Plan Goal: Serve as a bold leader in policy development and change



Develop the ability among staff in all areas of subject-matter expertise to assess the impact of proposed policy changes and propose new policies, including antiracist policies and policies that address racial inequities.



Use data and community input to guide policy development and change for all priority policy areas by building internal infrastructure and process to support policy staff in utilizing data products.




Public Health has a **public-facing policy presence** focused on sharing antiracist and health equity-focused policy information by creating a website with a policy dashboard, producing 2 policy briefs per year.
